


TOLIVEHERE ISAPRIVILEGE. TISAGE RANA MASER PALMERSTON

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MANAWATŪ, A NAME THAT MEANS "HEART STANDING STILL',

IS A PLACE WHERE FERTILE PLAINS NOURISH, WHERE OUR RIVER CARVES ITS OWN PATH FORWARD AND OUR MOUNTAIN RANGES - RUAHINE AND TARARUA - STAND TALL. FIRST SETTLED SOME 400 YEARS AGO BY MĀORI, THE REGION IS HOME TO THREE IWI: RANGITĀNE O MANAWATŪ, RAUKAWA AND NGĀTI KAUWHATA.



RANGITĀNE IWI - THE TANGATA WHENUA OR PEOPLE OF THE MANAWATŪ - TRACE THEIR ORIGINS BACK TO THE KURAHAUPO AND AOTEA MIGRATORY CANOES. ACCORDING TO MĀORI LEGEND, THE GREAT MANAWATŪ RIVER WAS NAMED BY EXPLORER HAU WHO HAD TRAVELLED DOWN THE COAST FROM TARANAKI, CHASING AFTER HIS RUNAWAY WIFE AND HER LOVER. HAU HAD ALREADY CROSSED OTHER BIG RIVERS, BUT THE MANAWATŪ MADE HIS "HEART STAND STILL".

The region spans 2,624 km² and encompasses breathtakingly beautiful parks, rivers and mountain ranges, including the famous Tararua and Ruahine Ranges, and sweeps out to the rugged west coast beaches of Himatangi and Tangimoana.

Over 120,000 people choose to call Manawatū home, with nearly 75% living in Palmerston North. Hop in the car and you're less than two hours from Wellington and one hour from Whanganui. It's also an easy drive to North Island ski fields, Hawke's Bay wineries and Mount Taranaki.

What makes Palmerston North city and Manawatū more liveable than most, is the world class education, flourishing industries (including technology, education and logistics) and a safe environment for raising a family.

Did you know Manawatū is recognised among some of the top agrifood hubs in the world? Home to more than 3900 scientists, researchers and innovators and national and global companies, the agritech and agrifood sector here is thriving.

OUR HISTORY

Manawatū, a name that means "heart standing still', is a place where fertile plains nourish, where our river carves its own path forward and our mountain ranges - Ruahine and Tararua - stand tall. First settled some 400 years ago by Māori, the region is home to three iwi: Rangitāne O Manawatū, Raukawa and Ngāti Kauwhata.

OUR LEGEND

Rangitāne iwi - the tangata whenua or people of the Manawatū - trace their origins back to the Kurahaupo and Aotea migratory canoes. According to Māori legend, the great Manawatū River was named by explorer Hau who had travelled down the coast from Taranaki, chasing after his runaway wife and her lover. Hau had already crossed other big rivers, but the Manawatū made his "heart stand still".

MANAWATŪ NOW

- >> Palmerston North's diverse population of 130 cultures and 90 languages provides access to all of New Zealand's diversity, within one compact location.
- >> 18.5% of the regional population affiliate as Māori (higher than national average of 16.2%).
- >> 5.3% of the city's population identify as Pasifika and 12% identify as Asian.
- >> 20% of the population were not born in New Zealand.
- >> Traditional international student population of over 3.000.*
- >> 37% of the city population is between 15-35 years. Palmerston North city has the second lowest median age in New Zealand at 33.9 years.
- >> More than 6,000 people are employed in the education sector in the Manawatū region.
- >> There are 3,900 people employed in science and research in the city.
- >> The city holds the highest percentage of doctorate degrees per capita than anywhere in New Zealand including the highest number of Māori with doctorate degrees.
- >> Palmerston North has been a refugee resettlement location for over 10 years (has welcomed the third most refugee arrivals of all locations in New Zealand).
- >> The region has the fastest growing Pasifika Community outside of Auckland.
- >> Manawatū's population has increased 32.2% since the year 2000.



Manawatū provides an established business ecosystem of national and global companies, startups, research institutes, educational organisations, defence forces and central and local government agencies. The region is in a strong position to continue bucking the trend of a cooling alobal economy.

We are home to FoodHQ, a collaboration of internationally recognised companies, research and educational institutions providing food companies and innovators access to one of the world's leading clusters of food science expertise and facilities.

The Fonterra Research and Development Centre (FRDC), one of the largest dairy research facilities in the world, has more than 300 researchers, engineers and scientists from 46 countries, including 130 PhDs. Synlait also has R&D facilities here.

You will find world leading agritech companies and boutique makers and innovators rubbing shoulders with the likes of Fonterra, Toyota and Ezibuy, one of Australasia's largest multi-channel retailers, whose headquarters are in Palmerston North.

Combine our innovative business minds with our prominent educational and research institutes. cultural diversity, safety and affordability, innovative and sustainable industries, and central location, and you have a robust and stable pool of qualified talent to power any successful enterprise. Pair all of this with our strong employment in agriculture, construction, manufacturing, services and defence sector employment, and you also have a business community unique to New Zealand.

We have survived 2020 due to our diversified and resilient economy, with our economy continuing to flourish. Looking ahead, we will continue to be a surge region over the medium to long-term.

Opportunities for investment in Manawatū are seemingly endless. We have a wide range of commercial and industrial development opportunities in the works, with \$4 billion of public investment and infrastructure secured and underway in the next 10 years.

In addition, government and public sector industries are also well represented in the city, with the Defence Force and multiple District Health Board service hubs both located here as well as Housing NZ, NZ Immigration Service, Te Puni Kōkiri and Studylink.

The Central New Zealand Distribution Hub is a huge project for the city, the region and New Zealand's economic growth. This hub will integrate rail, air and road transport, marrying greater efficiency for moving goods between rail, road and air. One of a kind in New Zealand, it will bring with it jobs and significant opportunities.

Frogparking employs graduates from Palmerston North's Massey University to fill engineering, marketing, design and production roles. Shareena's staff are like family, often catching up with each other

Manawatū is a hard region to beat when it comes to our walking and mountain bike tracks, and proximity to stunning beaches, rivers and swimming holes. Walk the dogs, take a picnic, stare at the beautiful scenery or mix up your running route. Take a ride down the premier mountain bike destination Arapuke Mountain Bike Park varying from grade two to grade five.

For walking tracks, we think the Ruahine and Tararua Forest Parks are unmatched in terms of their beauty and wild, natural landscape, as are the extensive walking trails alongside the Manawatū River. The Sledge Track and Rangiwahia Hut Track are hugely rewarding tramps, and Te Āpiti - Manawatū Gorge is one of the North Islands iconic outdoor destinations for walking and hiking.
